# **CUMBRIA PRIDE 2021**

- The Cumbria Pride Committee



Cumbria Pride's main event for 2021 was held on Saturday 25 September 2021 in Carlisle Castle's outer ward.

We had very mixed emotions this year. Last year nobody could attend Pride, this year only a limited number could. We were genuinely heartbroken that we couldn't open it up to everyone! Covid saw around 18 months without any physical Pride events anywhere. It's not a concert, or a party, Pride means so much more. We were faced with a choice to either reduce the numbers or cancel the event. Cancelling really was not an option, we know how much this is needed and how desperate our LGBT+ community was for it. Pride events are vital for people accessing support and hearing important messages! In an attempt to be as fair as possible, tickets were allocated via a free to enter raffle. We chose this method so that everybody had an equal chance to attend.

Whilst being very sad that we couldn't bring this event to everyone, we were thankful that we were able to bring it to some, especially as so many Pride events had to cancel again this year, including Silloth.

We invited Pride radio to come along so that people could tune in from home, and were really grateful to BrewDog and Tribe in Carlisle who held a Pride day where people who couldn't get tickets were able to safely visit to hear some of the event. We have also shared our committee footage via our Virtual Project.

We introduced our Virtual Project after cancelling our 2020 event, which we know was not the same but it was the best that could be done under the circumstances. Following our recent survey, we have listened to our community, and will continue with the Virtual Project but will now be bringing short snippets of information virtually whilst hopefully planning lots of physical events too.

It really was amazing to be able to hold our event after 2 long years of planning. Of course the event had to be a bit different to how we would have liked. Sadly we had to cancel our march as this could not have been done safely in light of Covid. The march is a very special part of Pride, helping to increase our visibility and giving us the opportunity to protest for our equality. We aim to plan a Pride march as soon as it is safe to do so, and will work in partnership with the LGBT+ organisations in Cumbria including OutREACH.

# BEING OUT IN THE OUTDOORS

I grew up in a small Cumbrian village - over an hour's drive from anywhere important. My parents let my brothers and I run free. Every night until sunset I paraded around that village, dragging behind me my reluctant little brother and the only other girl my age. I felt like the queen of this kingdom, which stretched from the river at the bottom of the hill, through overgrown woods, up the 'back road', across wide green fields full of bleating lambs, all the way up to the cusp of the Howgills. Beyond these boundaries I did not care to know or understand. This land made me feel bursting with potential – oh the places I could go!

As I grew into a teenager and learned about the wider world, the smallness of my home dawned on me. It contained me and stunted my growth – where were the opportunities I once felt this green land afforded me? I realised that to develop as a person I had to move away, to the big city, for a dose of culture, to see different ways of living, and to wise up.

So, at 18, with a false sense of maturity, unknown naivety, and full of promise, I moved to Manchester. I hated it. Squashed into a mouldy magnolia matchbox bedroom, which stacked neatly into a concrete complex of thousands of other lost teenagers, my pretence of being the queen of a kingdom was shattered. No more was I a big fish in a small pond - more like a minnow in the ocean. Feeling overwhelmed and overlooked, I slipped into a pattern of self-loathing and panic.

With significant effort, things did get better. And in hindsight, Manchester and its diverse people taught me a lot. The movers and shakers of Canal Street showed me the existence and validity of Queer identities. My university friends made me confront my own privilege of growing up with free access to open green space. Feminist protesters demonstrated the importance of standing up for what you believe to be right. Manchester opened my eyes, gave me tolerance and empathy, fired up my inner activist, and most importantly, illuminated my own Queerness.

Last year I burned out from 5 years of bustling city life and felt a calling back to a slower pace of life to the winding lanes, dry-stone walls, and bleak fell tops of Cumbria. Once again, I had a head for the hills. Realising my blissful childhood featured precisely zero LGBTQIA+ role models, I was understandably apprehensive to return to my roots. I feel Cumbria is a world away from Manchester in terms of inclusivity and diversity. When I walk down the street holding hands with my girlfriend, I am aware that people's heads turn. Knowing I do not fit in, I live in fear that someone's second glance may turn into a homophobic slur or punch.

When I've had enough of worrying whether every person I meet is going to accept me, I switch off my phone, head for the hills, and finally get to breathe. There is solace in climbing the mossy branches of a tree or dunking in the ice-cold gurgle of a stream - nature accepts me with open arms and without question. The forests and the rocks and the flowing rivers and the towering mountains and hedgehogs don't care if I'm Queer. By being 'out' in the outdoors I escape the confines of human prejudice and feel at home. In the immersive outdoors I can be myself.

I set my imagination alight with spontaneous and somewhat clumsy outdoors adventures. I have set off on 'serious' runs only to end up scrambling up a river joyously looking at rock formations. I have abandoned a 3km lake swim to dive down to the murky bottom and observe sun rays shimmering through luscious lily pads. I chase anything in the Cumbrian landscape which makes me feel alive and electric. I soak all that goodness up and use it as fuel.

Through life my feelings towards Cumbria have changed. Now I realise that at its heart, it is both beautiful and brutal. Whilst its natural landscape offers escapism and acceptance, its communities need to show greater LGBTQIA+ visibility, inclusivity, and equality. Therefore, the work of OutREACH is crucial and the more people that get involved the better! And to anyone who feels isolated, please know that nature accepts you as you are. I promise you there are plenty of potential LGBTQIA+ adventure buddies and I urge you to get OUT in the OUTDOORS!

LGBT+ safe spaces should be welcoming of everyone from the LGBT+ community, and should not tolerate any homophobic, transphobic or other discriminatory practices or actions.
